Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders

Conflict is normal and inevitable - whether in the home, school, community, church or workplace. Leaders in all walks of life often have a responsibility to help others work through their conflicts. The Mediation Skills Training Institute presented by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center (LMPC) is designed to equip church leaders with the skills necessary to deal effectively with interpersonal, congregational, and other forms of group conflict. The five-day institute also includes a component on congregational mediation and consultation, placed within the context of family systems theory. Although focused primarily on the church setting, the skills learned are directly transferable to other settings. Thus managers in business, attorneys, experienced mediators, and others in leadership will be enriched by the training as well.

contained church to one with missional goals. The church's ministry extended to sustaining church plants among Romanians, Hispanics, African-Americans and Anglo-Americans.

Additionally, LaBarre developed a ministry training program for Native Americans at All Tribes Community Church, Tulsa, Okla., which resulted in 11 tribal elders becoming licensed ministers.



"Church! Why would I ever go there? I was already feeling terrible about myself. They'd just make me feel worse!" This is a quote from a woman who had made some terrible choices with her life and was seeking help from a counselor. Obviously her understanding and experience with "the church" was not what we would hope our image in the community would be.

I often think, what comes to peoples mind when they hear "First Baptist Church". Do they see a great facility, needed programs, wonderful music, how about relevant preaching? When they hear about us do they think, Jesus, or hypocrites? Is it a painful feeling, hurt or loss of a part of their life? Are they angry because of our selfishness?

Jesus calls us to be a light, a city on a hill. He means for us to live and worship in a way that would draw people to Him. According to the scriptures He's not interested in our religiosity, He called the Pharisees, blind guides, hypocrites, whitewashed tombs, because they played religious games instead of serving God.

My favorite way is the full color, 20page photo book she makes containing pictures of our children, of me and our children, her and the children, and me and her for every Father's Day. The book is a pictorial celebration of our amazingly blessed life together.

As I look around ABC NE I want to celebrate with you in a way that would make "celebrators" like my wife proud. I want you to know about the great ministry going on in our churches. The great things our pastors are doing. That over 30 pastors and leaders attended the pastor's conference in May. You need to be aware of the amazing MCLE projects that happened this spring and are still happening now. Closed after 140 years of ministry

Baptist Congregational Federated Church of York closed its doors on May 6, 2012 after 140 years of ministry and service to the York community. The original First Baptist Church of York began services in 1873, within a year of the First Congregational Church. The two congregations merged in the 1930s.

From their beginning, community influence of the two churches was strong. A college was one of several areas of ministry in the early years.

Judson Baptist Church of La Vista Celebrates 125 Years!



The year 2012 marks the 125th anniversary of Judson Baptist Church of La Vista, Nebraska. For those of you who would like to impress your friends that you know a word that has two Q's, this is our quasquicentennial celebration!

Our congregation started out on September 11, 1887, and was known as Mission Church. From November 27, 1890, until September 6, 1916, we were known as First Baptist Church of South Omaha and we were located at 25th and "H" Streets. From September 6, 1916, until October 2, 1966, we were called Trinity Baptist Church.

Our name changed again in October of 1966 to Judson Memorial Baptist Church to honor Baptist missionary Adoniram Judson. In 1979 we simplified the name to Judson Baptist Church and remained in South Omaha until September of 2000.

At that time, the congregation voted to relocate to La Vista, Nebraska. We sold our old building to a Spanish-speaking Mennonite congregation. For a full year we were technically "homeless" and we rented office and worship spaces in a shopping mall and at Bryan High School. We often felt like we were "wandering in the wilderness." Our Building and Relocation Committee spent countless hours looking for a permanent location to buy or build on, all the time praying for a miracle since we were a small congregation and had very little money.

We received our miracle in the fall of 2001 when Prince of Peace Lutheran Church disbanded and gave us their church building and parsonage located at 8517 Park View Boulevard in La Vista, Nebraska, free of charge! In 2007 we completed a large classroom, office, kitchen, library and social area addition.

Throughout our 125-year ministry we have had 23 pastors. The longest term was Rev. George Van Winkle who served from 1897-1910. Our current pastor is Rev. Matthew P. Rappley who has been with us for two years.

We have three events planned for this year: a soup luncheon held February 12, a picnic to be held on June 10, and a catered luncheon after the church service on Sunday, September 9, 2012. We have invited all living pastors and their wives from as far back as 1959 to join us at this event.

Our theme this year is "Expect a Miracle." We are having a major fund drive to help pay down our mortgage on the new addition. We are confidently moving ahead as we have, indeed, experienced many miracles in the past.
