The Vision of Building Bridges Is Coming to Life!




The culmination of the Building Bridges Campaign is the construction of an Activity Building

Got Style? Evangelism for the Rest of Us!

You may remember reading about National Ministries' "Got Style?" evangelism program on one of the America For Christ bulletin inserts your church used to educate the congregation about how that money is invested in mission. NM's Office of Evangelism advocates a Natural and Relational style of evangelism.

In the Natural style, evangelism is linked to personality, not spiritual giftedness. God uses personality to reach outside the church, and spiritual giftedness is used to equip and empower inside the church.

We consider six distinct personality styles in our understanding of evangelism: Assertive, Analytical, Storytelling, Relational, Invitational, and Incarnational. These styles are adapted from the Willowcreek Association's evangelistic training program, "Becoming A Contagious Christian," and "The School of Evangelism" of the Evangelical Covenant denomination. Each model has a biblical parallel as indicated in the following chart.

Understanding your own personality style and the style of those you encounter can produce more successful efforts. When the style of the person you are sharing with is different from your own, it may be a struggle to 'click' with them. We often suggest that local churches or small groups construct teams of folks with various styles: these teams can help "match" folks with similar personalities. This way, you may be able to accomplish something together that you could not do alone.

The point, here, is that even though a person, or a whole church, may not have the gift of evangelism, God has wired people and churches in such a way that they can still "do" evangelism. It is just a matter of discovering their system and working within it. Though a person, after coming to faith in Christ, should "wait" for a time before taking on leadership roles and responsibilities within the church, there are no restrictions on how soon newfound faith should be shared. With the same passion (personality) that Paul persecuted the church, he, following his conversion, promoted it.

I have had the opportunity to provide this training in a number of our churches over the past few months. If your church is looking for ways to become more effective in its outreach and evangelism, have your pastor give me a call to schedule a time for me to provide this training for you.

Take five helps for praying for children:

- 1. Be specific.
- 2. Pray scripture passages out loud.
- 3. Write down your prayers.
- 4. Pray God's desires for your children.
- 5. Pray for your children's futures.

Extraordinary Opportunity . . . Mission—Fishing—Fellowship

Grand Island Pastor Charlie Gregory will once again lead a group to Canada for a Fishing/Mission/Prayer Retreat. This year's event will include a study of prayer and devotional practices, fellowship building in the great outdoors, and a focus on global missions. The mission emphasis will be provided by ABC/USA Global Consultant Mike Mann. Mike's missionary experience in Thailand is extensive and he now works with our mission partners around the world on agricultural and water issues.

This event is designed for those who love to fish. The group will spend 10-14 hours each day for three days in boats. Lac la Ronge has 1500 miles of shoreline and runs to 140 feet deep. It has great walleye, northern pike, and lake trout fishing.

The price includes cabins for four nights, all meals, unlimited boat, motor and fuel, one guide for every five people, fish filleting and freezing, all transportation between La Ronge, Saskatchewan, and camp, your three-day license, and taxes. Not included in the price is your transportation to La Ronge, fishing tackle and sleeping bag.

Members of the group will need to get to the town of La Ronge on Monday afternoon, July 7 and leave Friday morning, July 11.

The event will take place at Cornhusker Fishing Camp in Northern Saskatchewan (1325 miles from Omaha), owned by members of First Baptist of Broken Bow.

ABC BLITZ BUILD ON THE GULF COAST!

National Ministries is partnering with Habitat for Humanity of Greater Baton Rouge and the Carter Work Project 2008 on behalf of American Baptist Churches USA to build 11 homes for 11 deserving families in a Blitz Build. Some of these families were displaced by hurricanes Katrina and Rita and have permanently relocated to Baton Rouge.

The first week, April 28 - May 3, workers are framing exterior and interior walls, raising roof trusses and roof decking, and installing windows, doors and vinyl siding. During the week, May 12 – 17, 50 volunteers are needed to focus on completing vinyl siding, taping and floating sheetrock, painting, and installing trim work, cabinets and landscaping.






