Hope, Peace, Joy, Love

Dave's column in this issue of The Messenger is about preparing for Christmas. It got me to thinking about Advent, a time in the church calendar for preparation for Christmas. Some churches have Advent Wreaths & Candles. Other churches don't celebrate Advent as such, but December is still a time of expectancy as the days lead to Christmas.

There is no hard rule about what to call the Advent candles. I like the tradition that has the Sundays of Advent in order focusing on Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. But other traditions name the candles Prophet, Bethlehem, Shepherds, and Angels. And there are many other candle name traditions as well.

My prayer for you this season is for:

Hope -- In the words of the prophets, we find hope and expectancy. Hope is deep and powerful. I heard William Sloan Coffin once say, "Hope is what's born when optimism dies." I've never forgotten his words. Even when there seems no chance at all that everything will work out, we are called to be people of hope. And that very act of hope can change things.

Peace – This is a beautiful word. In our preparation for Christmas, it means the peace that passes understanding.

It is not just the absence of conflict, it is the presence of the Spirit. Seek hope and peace. They will lead you not only to Christmas, but along the way, you will find reduced stress and increased wellness.

Joy -- Another beautiful and powerful word. Joy is deep undergirding strength and affirmation. "Happy" on the other

hand, is a word suggesting surface or temporary pleasantness. It's a good thing but it doesn't come close to "joy." Experiencing true joy, and sharing it with others, can heal relationships.

Love – You may have used the expression, "Let's keep the main thing the main thing." Well, this is the main thing! This is what it's all about. This is the oneword book report on the Bible. Jesus birth is so amaz-

ing because it is actually the Lord of all the universe stepping into our lives to show us how to live. Love is the ultimate strategy for transformation.

May you be a blessing this Christmas and as the New Year begins. May your practice and expression of hope, peace, joy and love spread out and infect your family, your church and your community.

From the Associate Executive Minister......Steve Bils "Dear brothers and sisters, pray for us." 1 Thessalonians 5:25

Thus concludes the first epistle to those in Thessalonica, with a general request for prayer for Paul and his traveling companions. No specific prayer requests are mentioned, just a simple "pray for us."

I can't help but notice how frequently Paul mentions that he is praying for those to whom he is writing. He tells them he is praying for them, and then tells them what he is praying for concerning them. One of my favorite of these "I am praying for you" passages is in the first chapter of Colossians (vv.9-12).

"For this reason we also, since the day we heard it, do not cease to pray for you, and to ask that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding; that you may walk worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing Him, being fruitful in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God; strengthened with all might, according to His glorious power, for all patience and longsuffering with joy; giving thanks to the Father who has qualified us to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in the light."

He prayed for the knowledge of His will, for wisdom and spiritual understanding, for a walk worthy of the Lord and for fruitfulness, strength, patience and longsuffering, concluding with a prayer of thanksgiving. This makes my intercessory prayers for God to "be with them" and "bless so-and-so" pale.

When Jesus, in John 17, prayed for his disciples, the original twelve as well as for those of us who have followed through the ages, he used phrases like "keep through Your name those whom You have given Me, that they may be as one as we are one", "keep them from the evil one", "sanctify them by Your

truth", "I pray that they all may be one . . . that the world may believe that you sent me" and "that the love with which You loved Me may be in them."

Security. Holiness. Unity. Love. Grand themes that ought to be the petitions we bring before the throne on behalf of the people and churches in our region.

What would you like your family and friends to be praying for on your behalf? In the epistles to the Ephesians and to the Colossians, the Apostle Paul asked for prayer on his behalf with some specificity. In Colossians (4:3,4) Paul asked, "pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ." One group refers to these "open doors" of opportunity as "divine appointments." He goes on to further request, "Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should." In a parallel passage in Ephesians (6:19) he further asks, "pray for me . . . that I may open my mouth boldly to make known the mystery of the gospel."

Opportunity. Clarity. Boldness. Even after years as an ambassador for Christ, Paul is keenly aware that he needs his fellow believers to be praying for him and his ministry. He knows not to take anything for granted. He wants to go only and everywhere God is opening doors. He wants to be intentionally clear as he proclaims spiritual truth to those who don't have a theological vocabulary. He still finds the boldness he needs to be elusive at times. They prayed and God answered.

Brothers and sisters, pray for us. And pray for each other.

Amen.

ment to them, even in their struggles, so that the Glory of God can become known in them once again."



- From the Minutes of the June 1918 North Platte Association meeting: "After a ball game by the Preachers vs. the Sand Hillers, in which the Preachers won by six scores, a house full gathered for the evening service."
- In the minutes of the Nebraska State Convention annual session in 1922: There was a description of the growth of "Church Vacation Schools" (now called Vacation Bible Schools). "This year we had six schools in Omaha, one in Valley, one in Wahoo, one in Grand Island, one in Stromsburg, one in Holdrege, one in Gibbbon, one in Loup City and community schools in Lincoln and Hastings. This phase of work is growing very rapidly in the state. Once the Church Vacation School was thought to be adapted only to slum districts and to strictly foreign populations; now we know it to be adapted to any community and to be a mighty agency of religious education anywhere."
- From the Jan. 1959 MESSENGER: Members of the Palestine Church gathered in Nov. at the church grounds to shell corn that had been given from this year's harvest. \$1,043.21 was realized from the sale and from cash gifts. A consecration service was held as the money was dedicated to the Lord.
- From the same issue: At Bridgeport in Nov., 100 people attended the Thanksgiving Fellowship Dinner and as a result of the Lord's Acres Program a check for \$2,211 was presented.
- From the Dec. 1952 MESSENGER: "North Platte laymen held a very successful Waffle Supper in Nov. and are looking forward to a Pheasant Supper soon. There is speculation that a few "barnyard pheasants" may have to be added to the menu to supply the crowd."

Important Update on BUILDING BRIDGES . . .

The last phase of the Building Bridges Campaign is the construction of a multi-purpose building. Moving ahead with the project has been slowed for three reasons: 1. The state is requiring an expanded sewer system at camp. There has been much planning, discussion, engineering study, analysis, etc. We are waiting final approval of the design and scope of the system. It will be expensive. 2. We are trying to obtain estimates for three very different types of multi-purpose buildings; wood, metal, and the kind that looks like a large inflated marshmallow. Prices are frightening. 3. We need some major gifts before we open a fund-raising campaign to the general constituency. And, major donors need to know the financial scope of the project before they make their decisions . . . And staff continues to work to get accurate numbers for them.

WHAT CAN YOU AND YOUR CHURCH DO NOW! We need focused prayer. Director of Camping Clarence Reiss is working very hard to get all the data required by the state and the engineers regarding the sewer system. He is also working to get building contractors to give accurate estimates of costs of various kinds of buildings. WE NEED PRAYER FOR CLARENCE, CONTRACTORS AND STATE SYSTEMS. Several donors are considering major gifts. WE NEED PRAYER FOR DONORS. The ABC/NE Board and the Department of Camps & Conferences, working with Clarence and with Executive Minister Susan Gillies are trying to bring this vision to reality. WE NEED PRAYER FOR EVERYONE AT WORK ON THIS PRO-JECT. And with confidence and joy, please pray for everyone who will be blessed by the ministry that will take place in this building!
