#### **Nebraska Churches Build for Ministry**

Several American Baptist churches in Nebraska are engaged in construction projects to expand their ministry. These include churches in Tekamah, Broken Bow, Arnold and King Solomon in Omaha. Handicapped accessibility is a priority in all the projects.


**First Baptist of Tekamah** recently completed a two phase project. In phase one, the church constructed wide steps and a tiered landing along with a five passenger elevator. This was made possible by a bequest from a person who had concerns about handicapped access to the church building. In phase two, they remodeled the kitchen, doubling its size and rebuilt the back entry providing an emergency exit.

Pastor Steve Eggum reports that the level of energy in the congregation went up, giving improved, and five new families are attending. He said that the congregation has tried to be good stewards with the money they received and the Lord has blessed them. The whole project has provided valuable learning according to Eggum, "In construction, invariably you run into problems and discrepancies. The Master can work to correct mistakes and set things straight. It's the same with our lives. There are times when problems and disappointments occur, but the Master Builder, God's Son, is there to set things right and make us a new creation."

First Baptist of Broken Bow is engaged in a major project to enhance the ministry potential of their building. By adding to the side of their building (on top of a flat-roofed basement), the church will have a new ground-level entry, nursery, pastor's study, handicapped accessible bathrooms and a meeting room with kitchenette. Building chairman Glen Buchta says that the addition will make the building more welcom-

ing. "Interest in the project has grown as the building has gone up. Most of the construction is done. We'll be doing the painting ourselves and finishing ceilings, rest room fixtures, etc., as we can afford them." In addition to this project, the church building and parsonage each have a new roof, following hail damage last summer.

King Solomon Missionary Baptist in Omaha is constructing a new

# Go And Tell

The weeks leading toward Easter are very important to me. Whether observed as "Lent" or a "40 Day Spiritual Adventure" or by any other name, this time of personal and congregational reflection has, over the years, been very powerful. I hope you use this time, as well.

When I was in graduate school I studied and wrote about the way the church, toward the end of the Middle Ages, incorporated dramatic elements into worship to hold the interest of the congregation. Most of the people in that day could not read. The priests discovered that if they dramatized parts of the Mass, the people got the message more clearly. Worship became more vivid. The first of these dramatizations were called tropes – usually consisting of a few lines of dialogue. It doesn't seem like much to us, but, at that time, it was something special.

It is generally thought that the church brought about the demise of theatrical spectacle at the end of the Roman Empire because of excesses. (Like actually killing someone to make a murder scene in a play more authentic.) But many years later, the church brought drama back because it was an effective way to help the people understand and remember.

This example survives from the ninth century. It is called the Quem Quaeritis [Whom Seek Ye?] Trope

[ Angels ]: " Whom do ye seek in the tomb, O Worshippers of Christ? [ Worshippers ]: " Jesus the Nazarene, the Crucified, O Heavenly Beings.

[ Angels ]: " He is not here; He has risen, just as He predicted. Go and announce that He has risen from the tomb."

Over the centuries, this is the powerful, jolting, astonishing news of the triumph of life over death, good over evil, God's intervention in history.

As we prepare for Easter, perhaps we should ask ourselves whom we seek on Easter Sunday? And then we should do what we **always** do when we find out something powerful, jolting, astonishing, that is really good news . . . go and tell.

#### MISSION INFORMATION ONLINE

Many persons in my generation who have a strong interest in missions are failing to take advantage of the abundant resources that are available to us on the Internet. We appreciated the familiar newsletters we once received, but they are no longer coming to us. What we need to recognize is that more current information is available to us now than ever before.

For example, let's say you want a brief story for a mission moment in worship, information about a particular missionary and their work for a circle meeting, or to know about a particular need as a focus for your prayer for missions around the world. You can go to www.abc-usa.org, click on International Ministries (or go directly to www.internationalministries.org), click on missionaries, and then scroll down through the list of all of our international missionaries. Click on a persons name and you will get a profile of that person. Under his/her picture is a list of two or three of their journals. Click on one that looks interesting and you get that journal. You can print either the profile or the journal.

Or, if you are interested in missions in the United States, go to the ABC website and click on National Ministries (or go directly to www.nationalministries.org) and click on missionaries, Home Mission News, or any number of other choices. National Ministries doesn't have journals, but they do have missionary profiles with a description of their ministry. Educational Ministries also has their website.

Don't have a computer or not connected to the Internet? There are some people in your church that do who would be glad to get the information for you if you would only ask.

You may be surprised at the amount of information at your fingertips about every area of the ministries to which God has called American Baptists. Do I still prefer the information printed on paper? Yes! However, I recognize that the world continues to change and that this is the most cost effective way to receive the mission information that is so important to me. My grandchildren have already changed the ways they get information, and I'm working at it!

#### NEBRASKA CHURCH PROVES EVERYONE WINS IN THE CIRCLE OF GIVING Like the circle of life, what goes 'round comes 'round in the circle of giving

It's an age-old story--born again in the 21st century by Calvary Baptist Church in Omaha, Neb.--that by giving, we receive. Calvary sponsors the First Kachin Baptist Church of America, also in Omaha. This new church was planted in June 2002 by members of the Kachin tribe of Burma, who came to the United States in search of asylum after being forcibly removed from their country because of their ethnicity and Christian faith.

The Rev. Tom Thompson, Calvary's pastor, describes his church's primary role as that of "advocacy." Members help the Kachin people

find housing, jobs, and healthcare. Calvary also provides English-language classes and help for students developing conversational skills. The First Kachin Baptist congregation worships in Calvary's chapel as well.

Calvary's involvement in the Kachin church plant, Rev. Thompson says, "has been a blessing in so many ways. They have brought us a sense of vitality we thought we had lost."

The young Kachin Nebraskan congregation traces its heritage to an American Baptist missionary. Many years ago, missionary Ola Hansen put the Kachin language into an alphabet and translated the Bible.

Many of the Kachin people who relocated to the United States find their spiritual roots grounded in this late selfless missionary, now buried in Oakland, Neb. In fact, the asylum-seekers hold him in such high regard that they plan to raise funds for a significant marker on his grave. The fruits of missionary Hansen's gifts to the Burmese tribe were realized in the establishment of First Kachin Baptist Church. Now this church gives the gift of vitality and renewal to Calvary Baptist Church. The circle of giving and sharing God's gifts richly perpetuates itself.

This story was made available on the internet for all ABC regions to use in their publications. The Messenger thought Nebraskans would like to see it, too.

## Interim Ministry: Setting the stage for new growth. By Dave Lundholm

The time between pastors is seen by most churches as a scary time when the work of the church is put on hold and the church 'marks time' waiting for a new professional leader.

But the interim is not a dead time. Many important things have to happen in the life of the congregation. Things that are an essential foundation for the pastoral ministry that is to come.

The interim is a time when the loss of the former pastor is appropriately grieved. Losing a pastor is much more like experiencing a divorce than it is having an employee quit. The church has to deal with the pain of having a respected leader leave (or the pain of having to suggest that it was "time for a change.")

Another vital task in the interim is congregational self-reflection. The congregation must deal with the questions of: "What are we like?"; "Where have we been?"; and "Where is God leading us in the future?"

Good interim pastors know that they are not charged with starting new things but giving time and attention to the people and relationships of the congregation. Working to heal relationships that may have been strained in the time leading up to the pastoral change.

The interim is not a dead time but it is a scary time. Routine is broken. Things are different around church. This uncertainty also has a positive effect in congregational life. Scared people are more likely to seek God's will, comfort and guidance. So the interim is a time when a congregation can more deeply connect with God, and with the reason they exist.

When a cruise is over, the cruse ship returns to port. All of the previous baggage is removed and sent on. It is refitted, resupplied, and readied. And then the new cruise begins. The interim is the time of restoration in anticipation of the new voyage God has in mind for the congregation.
