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Make plans now to attend an inspiring and energizing event in Kearney September 20-22. "DISCOVER RENEWAL" is the theme for the annual ABC-NE Family Reunion (annual convention) to be held at the

Holiday Inn Convention Center in Kearney.

The theme scripture is Isaiah 40:31 (NIV):

"Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint."

> The Reunion will feature opportunities to discover renewal in Nebraska as well as nationally and internationally with speakers Harry Riggs and Chuck & Ramona Shawver.

"The planning committee has given us a great theme," said Executive Minister Susan Gillies. "Years ago Elton Trueblood wrote that renewal is not just another program of the church. It is the 'new order for our time—not recovery but advance.' The church in the 21st century will be effective if its own spiritual strength is sure and if it communicates contagious hope, joy and love."

In response to evaluations of previous conventions, more workshops will be available and each person will be able to attend two workshops rather than one.

President Bob Phares observed, "Just as Jesus' family went to Jerusalem once a year, American Baptists in Nebraska make a trip each fall to join with others of our family to worship and praise God, to learn and to experience the joy of fellowship. Each local church can be strengthened by having members participate in this experience."

One of my treasured books is a small volume that belonged to my parents. It is *Altars Under the Sky: Devotional Readings for Outdoor Days* by Dorothy Wells Pease. It

holds many memories for me. My parents liked to use it for daily family devotions when we were on vacations. The chapters include such titles as: "The Mountains," "The Sea," "Trees and Flowers," etc. (I don't think we ever used the chapter on the sea because we never made it that far on our vacations.)

Altars Under the Sky

Spending time out of doors in a peaceful setting, doing very little, can be very restorative to the soul, the mind and the body. The psalmist wrote, *"He lets me rest in fields of green grass and leads me to quiet pools of fresh water. He gives me new strength."* (Psalm 23:2-3a TEV)

There is something awesome about just being close to God's amazing creation. Poet Mary Carolyn Davies wrote, "Forests are made for weary

> men, that they may find their soul again." William Cullen Bryant wrote, "The groves were God's first temples . . . Ah, why should we, in the world's riper years. neglect God's ancient sanctuaries. and

adore only among the crowd, and under roofs that our frail hands have raised?" "Jesus left the city and went, as he usually did, to the Mount of Olives; and the disciples went with him." (Luke 22:39 TEV)

Dorothy Wells Pease, in the introduction to her book, writes: "Jesus often worshiped out of doors, going up on a mountain to pray, teaching from a boat on the lake shore, and constantly using nature as the basis for the parables. He did not neglect worshiping in the synagogue, 'as his custom was,' but found in the open something which evoked worship and brought God nearer to him."

Somehow in the greatness and wonder of nature, we can feel in fresh ways our deep relationship with the creator. My prayer is that you will find time to be with God in a special out door place this summer.


Following the September 11 trag-

Regrettably, eastern United States and Afghanistan were not the only places that suffered serious devastation last year. There were earthquakes, floods and hurricane Michelle. In response to the great needs, the ABC World Relief Committee approved more than 85 relief and development projects around the world to receive grants from OGHS funds. These funds offered help and hope to victims of 9/11, but also to millions of people everywhere who are desperate to survive the terrorism of hunger, poverty, disease, war, oppression, injustice.

- Steve Carlson is coordinator for ABBoys & Young Men for the ABMen of Nebraska.
- 2. Karen Howard is coordinator for ABGirls for ABW Ministries of Nebraska.
- Dave Janzen is Assistant Camp Director at Camp Moses Merrill. Dave continues his role in facility maintenance but he is also devoting a portion of his time to programming responsibilities for ABC summer youth camps.
- Jason Workman is an adjunct staff person for youth ministry on the region staff. In early May the Executive Committee of the region approved the appointment of Jason to this position. Jason will continue his work as Associate Pastor of Benson Baptist in Omaha but, in addition, will contribute a few hours each month to facilitating aspects of youth ministry in the state.
- 5. Dave Lundholm is Area Minister and has responsibility for coordinating planning and accountability for youth ministry.

Don't Muzzle Your "Ox"!

(1 Cor 9: 4, 7-14) Don't we have the right to food and drink ... Who serves as a soldier at his own expense? Who plants a vineyard and does not eat of its grapes? Who tends a flock and does not drink of the milk? Do I say this merely from a human point of view? Doesn't the Law say the same thing? For it is written in the Law of Moses: "Do not muzzle an ox while it is treading out the grain." Is it about oxen that God is concerned? Surely he says this for us, doesn't he? Yes, this was written for us, because when the plowman plows and the thresher threshes, they ought to do so in the hope of sharing in the harvest. If we have sown spiritual seed among you, is it too much if we reap a material harvest from you? If others have this right of support from you, shouldn't we have it all the more? But we did not use this right. On the contrary, we put up with anything rather than hinder the gospel of Christ. Don't you know that those who work in the temple get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share

in what is offered on the altar? In the same way, the Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel.

(1 Tim 5:17-18) The elders who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially those whose work is preaching and teaching. {18} For the Scripture says, "Do not muzzle the ox while it is treading out the grain," and "The worker deserves his wages." NIV

The Scriptures are clear. The church is responsible to provide a living for those they have called to be their pastor. This means that the church is responsible for providing a wage on which it is possible to live today. This means that it is responsible to provide a place for the pastor to live or the means for the pastor to make their own arrangement. This means that it is responsible to provide medical care for the pastor and pastor's family. This means that it is responsible to provide for income for the pastor in the retirement years.

We live in a time when many of our churches are feeling a financial pinch. Medical costs have increased drastically, recent fuel / electric costs have risen significantly, and other costs have also increased. Some churches in response to this pinch have decided not to offer retirement benefits to their pastors. Others have chosen not to offer full medical coverage to their pastors. Others have deferred pastoral raises. In all of these cases the churches are asking the pastor to take care of the church's responsibility. They are asking the pastors to support themselves. This is wrong. "Who serves as a soldier at his own expense?"

Just like any member of the church, the pastor contributes financially to the life of the congregation through their tithes and offerings. It doesn't seem fair to me that they should also be asked to pay their own medical, or provide their own retirement. Clearly from Scripture, it is the responsibility of the church to provide for the support of their pastor.

2. a. Kodiak. Mission work continues there today.

3. b. In the mid-1800s, some missionaries were called *colpor-teurs* (the French word for those who carry items.) They traveled in remote areas of the country with Bibles and Christians books.

4. a & b Helen Barrett Montgomery was elected in 1921 as the first woman president of what is now the ABC. She also translated the New Testament. The Montgomery New Testament is still available.

5. c. In "Shalom Response," congregations comforted those who mourned and supported Sept. 11 relief efforts in personal action and One Great Hour of Sharing contributions.

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
