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A Chapel Will Be Built at Camp Moses Merrill



Major financial gifts are making it possible to build a chapel at Camp Moses Merrill. Work is beginning now to clear the land. Actual construction will begin in the spring.

Mrs. Floretta Ward, a member of Sunset Hills in Omaha, has made a commitment to give an initial gift of \$200,000 for the chapel. Mrs. Ward is a strong advocate for programs and facilities that encourage the spiritual development of young people.

Her gift was followed by a commitment of \$100,000 from Rev. Palmer Swenson, also of Sunset Hills. Rev. Swenson is a retired pastor who has long been an encourager and supporter of Camp Merrill. These two gifts will provide the necessary funds to build and furnish the chapel.

Omaha architect Larry McChesney is designing the chapel. (He is connected to Nebraska Baptists through his sister Sandy Denton, at First Baptist, Lincoln.) The design of the chapel will allow for flexible seating. The center of worship can be in the front of the chapel at the base of a floor to ceiling window, or it can be in the center of the room. There will be built-in audio and video capabilities. One of the special features of the chapel will be a large cross carved from Camp Merrill cedar.

The Chapel is part of a wider vision to expand the ministry of the camp. This vision is called "Building Bridges." Construction of an outdoor amphitheatre will be completed this fall. Plans are being made for an adult conference facility with a meeting room and 12-15 motel-type rooms. Plans are also being designed for an activity building.

Great Opportunity for Men from ABC/NE

A special event is happening November 2 in Kansas City. It is a unique "MegaRally" for men from American Baptist churches and their friends. According to planners, the rally will be Saturday-intensive, with "five star" preaching, music and workshops. Additional worship programming will be offered on the preceding Friday night and the following Sunday morning, in cooperation with First Baptist Church of Kansas City, KS



and Central Baptist Theological Seminary. Further pre- and post-rally programming will include leisure and work-related activities such as golf tournaments, rope courses, work on a Disaster Relief trailer or Habitat for Humanity project.

The MegaRally will feature keynote speaker Dr. Harry Riggs, Director of Church Transformation, ABC/USA and concert musician Rev. John Polite, popular recording artist "JP" and Pastor of Panorama Baptist Church, North Hollywood, CA. See www.ThisIsJP.com

Registration fees are \$25 per person, \$20 per person for two or more people, and free for pastors who bring four or more paying registered men from their church. God's Great Surprises

For many devout and dedicated Christians, prayer is an integral part of daily life. Why is it then, that we can be stunned when God grants a prayer request or surprises us with something for which we couldn't have thought to ask?

My grandmother said we get what we look for. If you expect someone to say something stupid, you are absolutely sure to notice it when it happens. If you look for bad news you will find it. If you look for what's wrong with your pastor or your church you'll find something wrong. It is also true, according to my grandmother, that if you look for something good to happen, it will. If you expect a blessing, you'll find it.

I have been overwhelmed by God's surprises recently. Since I arrived here two years ago, I have been praying that the ministry at Camp Merrill would be what God wanted it to be. But, who would have thought we would now be thinking of building new facilities at Camp Moses Merrill. No one went out looking for Floretta Ward or Rev. Palmer Swenson to see if they wanted to build a chapel. They simply came and said it was what they wanted to do. And right in the middle of those amazing conversations about a chapel, an anonymous donor slipped in and funded an outdoor amphitheatre. God used these gifts to stimulate a complete reassessment of buildings at Camp. We realized we have a wonderful opportunity and responsibility to be more effective stewards of this ministry.

Another of God's surprises came this summer. I had been praying for someone to catch the vision for a new church in northwest Omaha. I had also been praying for ABC/NE to begin a Hispanic church. But I had no way of antici-

pating what God was about to do. Pastor Tom Thompson, Calvary, Omaha, came to my office with Pastor Gam Lahpai. The outgrowth of that meeting was the establishment of First Kachin Baptist Church of America. This church of tribal people from Myanmar (Burma) is going to have a profound affect on us all. God is showing us in dramatic fashion the results of our deep commitment to mission and also gifting us with a wonderful new church.

I'm looking for and praying for renewal in our churches, I'm looking for and praying for good Christian folks to rise above the conflicts that can eat away at the soul of a congregation, I'm looking for and praying for pastors to feel rejuvenated by the support and encouragement of their congregations. I can't wait to see what surprises lie ahead!

MINISTRY AND BUDGETS

It always helps to interpret what someone writes if we know their biases. Therefore, let me state clearly as I begin this article that I believe in budgeting. At the beginning of every calendar year I sit down and write out a budget for my expected income and expenditures in the coming year. The expenditures are broken down into monthly amounts for giving, savings, groceries, medical, auto, etc. Then throughout the year I keep detailed records of what I spend and compare it periodically with the spending plan. This is a discipline which helps me be a better steward of God's resources, and which will help families avoid much of the conflict that often relates to the use of money.

Soon your church will be preparing a budget for next year. This budget will help you plan how you will fund the ministries in your church and beyond to which God has called you. For many finance committees, this process will begin with a discussion of the economy, and unless things have changed between now and then, that discussion could very well control the process and determine the outcome. But it doesn't have to be!

I like the suggestion of Ed Guerard (WMS, ABC of MA) that the budget talks begin with the Scripture, prayer and celebration rather than stock market reports and budget spreadsheets. What if each person on the board or committee would choose a text that gives insight into the budget process and share why they chose it. The group could then pray for guidance in understanding and applying those insights to the task of budget building. And then you could take time to list and celebrate the ministry and mission outreach of your church. Now it would be time to talk about the budget.

Budgets are important, but only as they assist your church in managing God's resources and carrying out the mission to which God is calling you. Therefore, the primary focus needs to be on ministry and mission, not money.

Making a Commitment to Renewal

This year's ABC of NE Family Reunion explored the theme "Discover Renewal." The theme stimulated a great deal of discussion about the on-going need for renewal for individual Christians and for churches. Some of the discussions included the following:

Renewal is not a one-time experience. Since one definition of renewal is that it is "the process of making new, fresh, or strong again" we need to seek renewal continually in our walk of faith.

Renewal begins with focused prayer. Perhaps the most important element in the renewal of First Baptist, Bridgeport, is that it began with spiritual discernment. The congregation started with personal spiritual renewal. They went through a prayerful process to select a theme scripture for the church. Putting personal and then corporate prayer and Bible study first, gives the whole renewal emphasis a solid foundation. It is hard to be effective in reaching new believers if the congregation is spiritually "sleeping."

Renewal involves an awakening. When our faith is reawakened and refreshed, it becomes evident in our worship, our evangelism and our service. It calls us to a recommitment to a living, joyous faith . . . living out our faith in our daily lives. It means seeking to do the right thing in our business decisions, seeking to do the right thing in our community, seeking to do the right thing in our homes . . . and churches.

Renewal helps put things in perspective. As renewed Christians, we are able to clearly focus on priorities we and our churches have established through prayer and Bible study. By asking, "What is God asking of us today?" we are able to put our energy into sharing the love of Christ, building healthy relationships, extending caring ministry to a hurting world.

TOMORROW'S HARVEST

Tomorrow's Harvest is the name of a new mission partnership of ABC of the Dakotas, ABC of Iowa and Minnesota, ABC of Nebraska and National Ministries ABCUSA for the spiritual transformation of the churches of these Regions. This renewal process will involve nine churches – three from each region. Currently the Nebraska churches that have signed on to participate are First Baptist, Columbus, and Parkside, Omaha. Participating churches of Tomorrow's Harvest will gather at the First Baptist Church of Storm Lake, Iowa, for a time of celebration and commissioning on Saturday, October 19.


Tomorrow's Harvest is described as, "God's call for churches to rediscover the freshness of being the people of God." The theme scripture for the process is Hosea 10:12, "Sow for yourselves righteousness; reap steadfast love; break up your fallow ground; for it is time to seek the Lord, that he may come and rain righteousness upon you."

Several years ago, Dr. Richard Sutton of ABC's National Ministries, began to work with nine churches across the country in a new model of local church renewal. First Baptist Church of

Bridgeport was one of those nine. To further test the model used in the first project, Dr. Sutton is now working with the new tri-region group to see if the same approach will be helpful. The results of this new undertaking will then be reflected in materials for churches nationwide.

Pastor Appreciation

Some churches celebrate Pastor Appreciation Month in October and some in November. Whichever month you choose, it is important to recognize the contributions of your pastor. This year the Ministerial Leadership Commission of ABC-USA is encouraging churches to celebrate Pastor Appreciation Month. The Commission is engaged in a clergy health initiative as reported in June in Christian Century magazine:

"In response to reports of clergy burnout, American Baptist Churches in the U.S.A. has decided to make wellness a priority issue for its ministerial leadership over the next five years.

'We concluded that often ministerial leaders do not seek their own wellness because the community expects them to do many other things,' said Ivan E. George, executive director of the Ministerial Leadership Commission of the American Baptist Churches.

George said the new emphasis will give clergy 'a sense of permission' to take care of themselves in addition to planning budgets, marrying couples and tending to the sick. In 2000, American Baptist clergy totaled more than 8,900 men and women.

The commission has created a definition of 'clergy health' that includes balanced nutrition, emotional well-being, periods of spiritual reflection and a sense of fulfillment with one's job. George said the church community should be involved in maintaining a minister's health by providing opportunities for retreats and resources for sabbaticals.

'What we are saying is that we need to change our cultural values so that his or her wellness is as important as his or her achievement,' George said in an interview. The new approach was approved at a recent commission meeting following a yearlong study that showed ministers were experiencing burnout and other problems. –RNS"

SOME RECOMMENDATIONS ON PASTORAL COMPENSATION

[Area Minister Dave Lundholm has been addressing issues of clergy compensation in the last several issues of *The Messenger*. He has conducted surveys of Nebraska pastors, done research on comparable regions and reviewed national data.]

Cash Salary and Housing:

Consider giving the following cost of living adjustment for your pastor in 2003.

If average attendance is over 150 and...

Pastors Salary and Housing is less than 16% of total budget then consider giving the M&M recommended cost of living adjustment +1%.

Pastors Salary and Housing is greater than 16% of total budget then consider giving the M&M recommended cost of living adjustment.

If average attendance is between 100 and 149 and...

Pastors Salary and Housing is less than 33% of total budget then consider giving the M&M recommended cost of living adjustment +1%.

Pastors Salary and Housing is greater than 33% of total budget then consider giving the M&M recommended cost of living adjustment.

If average attendance is less than 100 and...

Pastors Salary and Housing is less than 38% of total budget then consider giving the M&M recommended cost of living adjustment +1%.

Pastors Salary and Housing is greater than 38% of total budget then consider giving the M&M recommended cost of living adjustment.

Every three to five years consider giving a merit increase in ad dition to the normal cost of living adjustment.

If you have a full time pastor, provide M&M retirement benefits and full medical coverage for them.

In multiple staff churches consider providing M&M retirement benefits and full medical coverage for each full time staff position.

Provide reimbursement for all professional expenses: books, convention expense, continuing education expense, hospitality, ministers' council dues and mileage.

Provide a reasonable amount of time for continuing education (usually about 10 days per year.) Provide for a study sabbatical leave after each seven years of service to your church.

Provide at least four weeks vacation per year.

He maintains contact with pastors in the eastern part of Nebraska, attends pastors meetings and is available to respond to the special needs of pastors and their families.
