Nebraskans Open Hearts In Response to Gulf Coast Disaster

From the first days following Hurricane Katrina, Nebraska Baptists were asking what they could do to help. The first team left on Sept 4, followed by five others on Sept 12.

Efforts were coordinated with the entire ABC family. American Baptist Men's Trailers rolled from various regions around the country. American Baptist Women's Ministries put together wallets of pre-paid cards for grocery, drug and discount stores to give to displaced persons. ABC clergy provided pastoral care for those affected by the disaster. ABY outh engaged in fund-raisers and helped assemble emergency supplies. Churches across Nebraska and the nation gave to One Great Hour of Sharing. Additional gifts in Nebraska paid for gas for the response teams. And everyone prayed.

ABC-USA Commends Nebraska Efforts

The Executive Committee of the ABC-USA General Board, meeting in Atlanta Sept. 15-16, issued a commendation to the ABC of Nebraska and the ABC of West Virginia for their prompt responses to the gulf coast disaster.

The ABC/NE "Churches Helping Churches" Initiative By Bob Phares, Chairman, CHC Taskforce

In May of 2005 the Region board adopted the **Churches Helping Churches Initiative** in response to our ABC/NE Mission Statement and the vision of New Life 2010. Our stated purpose w as to "encourage local ABC churches in Nebraska to connect w ith each other in ministries of teaching, nurturing, evangelism and fellow ship".

Responding to Need

Over the last few weeks we have had the experience of responding to the devastating tragedy of Hurricane Katrina.

tures on the TV, it was like looking through a straw. When he got there, and saw it 360, it was more than he could believe. But even for us w ho "looked through a straw" w atching it on TV, it became more than we could handle. Trying to imagine ourselves trying to cope with the crisis made us sick.

Most people who saw the images, wanted to help in some way. Rich people, poor people, Americans, folks from friendly and unfriendly nations – most of us wanted to do something. We couldn't stand to watch the pain. Not unlike the feeling we had just after Christmas when we saw the horror of the tsunami. Whether close or half a world away, we are connected.

Some of us exhausted ourselves being mad. Mad at people w ho didn' t design a reasonable evacuation plan for a vulnerable city, mad that help couldn't get there sooner, mad that a loving God didn't stop the storm. Others of us tried to escape it. One person told me, "I can handle it in the new spaper but not on TV."

Nebraska Baptists w ere given a unique role w e didn' t seek. I' ve been asked to share our disaster response strategic plan. We didn't have one. It was simply that the pictures were too much. On that first Friday, we just put the word out that we would gather together anyone who wanted to do something. In two hours we had a dozen folks around a table deciding what to do. I looked around that table and saw folks from churches that were that your hand guides, as the faithful go. In predominately European American, African American, Kachin and Sudanese. And I thought, "this is what Nebraska Baptists

look like now." I thanked God for the courage and determination of that group. And from that meeting, our response was born.

One military person on the scene said that when he saw the pic- Prayer services were held, money was raised, people donated supplies and volunteered their time and vehicles.

> For that moment, we kept our eyes on Jesus. And this relatively small region of the ABC, seemingly without adequate financial resources, got out of the boat and did w hat needed to be done. I can't express how grateful I am to serve with you.

> The ABC-USA General Secretary sent his thanks. And Rev. Dr. Cheryl F. Dudley at Valley Forge wrote a prayer dedicated to those first efforts:

Prayer in Celebration of God's Work through God's People

(In honor of the first caravan from ABC of Nebraska) We thank you, oh God, for the response of your people; your people who said, "we cannot wait, we must do something now" and did. They went without a clear plan but with willing hearts and supplies given and gathered compassionate souls. They went, having been sent with assurance that you would meet them there. You did. Your Spirit guides us through the darkness of our lives. Darkness is the same as light to you. Thank you for seeing ahead when we cannot. We are grateful, O God Christ's name. Amen.

After recounting in chapter eleven the testimonies of the women and men who, by faith, "subdued kingdoms . . . worked righteousness . . . out of weakness were made strong . . . became valiant in battle," the author of Hebrews begins chapter twelve with an exhortation to us to run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking ultimately to Jesus, who for the joy that was set before Him, endured the cross. Often we sacrifice the rewards of incomparable eternal value to avoid enduring anything.

I don't believe Hebrews 11 is an exhaustive list of all we those we should look to for examples of faith and faithfulness. The ABMen of Nebraska identified a sterling example when they recognized Rev. Palmer Sw enson for a lifetime of achievement by naming him their 2005 Clergy Person of the Year.

Palmer grew up one of ten children on a Minnesota farm. After surviving what should have been a fatal illness at the age of 2, he went on to letter in football all four years in high school. He received a call to ministry at the age of 15 and was licensed to preach at 19. He attended Northern Seminary, graduating with a ThB in 1944, two years after marrying Helen Bates. He was ordained the same year at Foster Park Baptist Church in Chicago. Palmer and Helen had three children.

In addition to working at Camp Moses Merrill (see the photo from 1952) and Sjoux Falls College. Palmer faithfully served pastorates in Illinois, Minnesota, South Dakota, Nebraska (Sunset Hills) and Wyoming before "retiring" in 1984. Since then he served interim pastorates at Tekamah, Mason City, Ansley, First Lincoln, Second Lincoln, First Omaha, Mead Emanuel, Omaha Immanuel, and Sunset Hills. Sunset Hills Baptist Church named Rev. Sw enson Pastor Emeritus in June, 2004.

We all need heroes and role models. In Nebraska, we need look no farther than the men and women of faith like Palmer Swenson who, by faith, have "obtained a good testimony."

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An Opportunity for Laity to Take a Look at the Covenant and Code of Ethics for Ministerial Leaders of American Baptist Churches (part 6)

Affirmation 6 reads as follows:

"I will maintain a disciplined ministry in such ways as keeping hours of prayer and devotion, endeavoring to maintain wholesome family relationships, sexual integrity, financial responsibility, regularly engaging in educational and recreational activities for professional and personal development. I will seek to maintain good health habits."

It would be very easy to extend the commentary on this affirmation over the course of six or seven monthly columns. This affirmation is hugely important but I will just comment on the high points.

- ... keeping hours of prayer and devotion... We aren't talking about 5 minutes a day with the Secret Place, rather significant chunks of time for prayer and devotional activities that feed the pastor's soul. One of the key indicators that a pastor is about to leave ministry is that times of prayer and devotion drop off his or her schedule. We are rediscovering in Nebraska that time in prayer results in miraculous opportunities and resources for ministry. It's ok to hold your pastor accountable in the area of keeping intentional times of prayer and devotion.
- ... w holesome family relationships... Often the most neglected parishioners are the pastor's family. I recently charged a Nebraska pastor to "...give a juicy slice of your time to your family... and not merely let them have the crumbs that fall from your time table." Most pastors whose family has left the nest regret that they didn't spend more time with their family. Hold your pastor accountable in this area. (And give them the uninterrupted time and space to pursue w holesome family relationships.)
- ... sexual integrity... This means fidelity in marriage and

celibacy if not married.

- ... financial responsibility... Many churches have stories of pastors that came, ran up debts and then left without paying them. Some pastors (like many others) have gotten over their heads in consumer debt. Neither of these practices is acceptable. Pastors are called to live within their means, provide for their future, and fulfill their responsibilities.
- ...educational and recreational activities.... In order to stay fresh, pastors need to be constantly challenged by new ideas and approaches. They also need to review some of the learnings they had in their education in light of the experiences they have had in the practice of ministry. In addition there is the saying, "All work and no play makes Jack a dull (preacher)."
- ... good health habits ... (In light of my recent health issues this one is particularly meaningful to me). Many pastors w ork in excess of 60 hours a week. For many, exercise is moving from the platform chair to the pulpit. Many pastors are over their ideal w eight, and don't care w hat they eat. Some haven't seen a doctor in years. You can expect your pastor to be an example to you in pursuing good health.

Your pastor has covenanted to maintain a disciplined ministry. It is appropriate for the congregation to hold them accountable to this covenant.


