We are "running this race" together

As many of you know, I serve as the President of the ABC-USA Regional Executive Ministers Council. Because of that role, early in January I received a request from a study group in West Virginia asking me to answer some questions about denominational relationships. The group is not being negative. They are just gathering perspectives as they seek to inform the board of their region. They seemed to be asking "what difference does it make if we are connected?"

Before I could even answer the questions, the Sago Mine Disaster was on the news. The event was so very sad and I prayed. Then I learned that Sago Baptist Church, where the miners' families waited, was an ABC church. It became an event happening to my family. Just as tragic, just as sad – but connected. I prayed again and again for not only the miners and their families but also for Sago Pastor Wease Day and other pastors, lay leaders and region staff. I remembered the times I visited churches in West Virginia and the times I have laughed and cried and prayed with friends there that I came to know through the ABC.

Then 12 miners were found dead. On the ABC website I read the story of miner Martin (Junior) Toler and learned that he was a deacon at Stump Chapel in Sutton, WV, and very active in West Virginia Baptist Convention life. His note to his family said he would meet them "on the other side." Praise God for his life, his witness and for the faith that carries us right across the divide into eternity.

ABC General Secretary Roy Medley immediately extended the care and concern of the ABC family. I suggested to our pastors that they might want to send condolences, letting the folks know that they have brothers and sisters in Christ in Nebraska praying for them. With regard to material support, National Ministries' executive director, Rev. Dr. Aidsand F. Wright-Riggins III, said assistance is available as needs are identified, with funds contributed by American Baptists through One Great Hour of Sharing. "At times such as these, our actions are the embodiment of God's love reaching out to those in despair. We pray and care for our brothers and sisters in Christ to prove that God, indeed, does not forsake us, even in the darkest night."

I finally crafted my responses to the questions from the folks in West Virginia. It was hard to put the fullness of my heart onto the page. I realized we are connected to each other in the ABC family by a common commitment to mission nearly 200 years old. We have entered into sacred covenants with each other as churches and regions and national mission organizations. We are "running this race" together. We are family.

American Baptists have long recognized the importance of "home" missions. Many of the oldest churches in our region were established by home missionaries who followed Moses and Eliza Merrill to the Nebraska Territory, sent by the American Baptist Home Mission Society and the Woman's American Baptist Home Mission Society.



The American Baptist Home Mission Society began in 1832 to address the spiritual needs of people in the frontier. The purpose of the Home Mission Society was "to preach the Gospel, establish churches and give support and ministry to the unchurched and destitute." In 1877, the Woman's American Baptist Home Mission Society organized to "proclaim the Christian faith and to minister to people of special need." In 1955, the American Baptist Home Mission Society and the Woman's American Baptist Home Mission Society merged. In 1972, the combined Home Mission Societies became known as National Ministries.


Every spring American Baptist congregations unite in receiving the America For Christ offering to help continue this mission and ministry throughout the United States and Puerto Rico. While to some, foreign missions might seem more glamorous or worthy, the reality is that the United States has become the third largest mission field in the world. The work that our home missionaries do is exactly the same work that many of our foreign missionaries do. Neighborhood centers, church planting, evangelism training, disaster relief, group mission experiences — the work is the same, only the location of those ministered to changes.

Congregations that are serious about outreach and missions recognize the opportunity that the America For Christ offering provides to become more deeply involved, partnering with other churches, to reach our closest neighbors for Christ . This spring ask your church's leaders to establish a goal for this year's America For Christ offering that accurately reflects your commitment to "preach the Gospel, establish churches and give support and ministry to the unchurched and destitute" and to "proclaim the Christian faith and to minister to people of special need" in your own back yard.




MISSION UPDATE FROM THE CONGO from Lynn and Virgil Nelson

The invasions of the DRC from the "east" were "officially ended" several years ago, but it is taking years to end the fighting. The UN presence is invaluable, and hopefully in the coming year, more of the population will be allowed to begin to consider re-establishing those aspects of their "former lives" that they can salvage.

"Entering" a new school, a new program, a new work-place, a new family, a new church, or a new culture: one feels both the anticipation of "new beginnings and possibilities" and unknowns, perhaps coupled with fears of failure, or of not belonging. When one "enters" into any activity: one participates and invests oneself.

Here in Kikongo, we celebrate:

- The "entrance" of over 100 elementary school students into their nearly completed three new classrooms.
- The "entrance" of the UN supported multi-tribal team who "enrolled" over 3,000 of our area residents to vote in the upcoming local and national elections.

An Opportunity for Laity to Take a Look at the Covenant and Code of Ethics for Ministerial Leaders of American Baptist Churches (part 8)

Affirmation 9 reads as follows:

"I will, upon my resignation or retirement, sever my ministerial leadership relations with my former constituents, and will not make professional contacts in the field of another ministerial leader without his/her request and/or consent.

This affirmation tends to be very difficult for lay people to understand and for clergy to practice.

When a pastor resigns from a church, effective the date of the resignation, that person is no longer the pastor. The normal pastoral functions: hospital visitation, counseling, preaching, officiating at weddings and funerals are expected to cease. The reason for this is to give the church time to prepare for new leadership.

One of the binds in which pastors find themselves is when a former parishioner calls and requests that the former pastor officiate at a wedding or a funeral. An automatic answer of "no" feels uncaring and insensitive. An answer of "l'll do it if it's ok with the present pastor" places the serving pastor in a bind. The serving pastor really has to say yes whether they want to or not.

Well, what's the big deal? Why does it really matter who performs weddings and funerals? The significant events in the life of the church (weddings, funerals, baptisms etc.) provide an opportunity for the pastor and congregation to bond. When the pastor resigns, the bond between pastor and congregation should begin to weaken to make room for bonding with the new pastor. When a former pastor repeatedly returns, his bond to the congregation is strengthened and the congregation's bond to the new pastor never has an opportunity to form.

The best way to prevent this bind is for it to be understood that weddings and funerals are to be performed by the serving pastor. In the rare case when there are compelling reasons why a former pastor should serve in this way, the person desiring this should discuss the reasons with the serving pastor and then, if the serving pastor concurs, the serving pastor should be the one to invite the former pastor to officiate.

Another difficulty occurs when a pastor retires in the community where they have served but doesn't really retire from the church. The retired pastor continues to make the same style of hospital calls that they did when they were serving and provides the same level of spiritual counsel to those who they used to serve. A further difficulty can occur if the spouse of the retired pastor is unwilling to relinquish the role of "first lady" of the church. Either of these situations prevents the congregation from bonding with the new pastor and their family and in a very real way inhibits ministry. This is the reason for the general recommendation (not required by the covenant and code of ethics) that pastors retire to communities where they have not served.

Fortunately, in Nebraska, the majority of retired pastors are extremely sensitive to these issues and have successfully discovered and enjoy their new role as retired clergy.
