Join the Celebration! ABC/NE Family Reunion September 15-17, 2006



Finding Abundance

It may seem a bit "Pollyanna" to suggest that having abundance I could describe accurately and in detail the fact that Camp in your life depends on the way you look at your life. But it's true.

This is a great time to be in ministry in Nebraska.

It's easy to be thankful for the abundant gifts of God when everything is going well. The day of the Calvary Lodge dedication is an example. The crew at Camp Merrill set up 100 chairs for the dedication service. Later, when I talked with Camp Director Clarence Reiss, I found out he had thought 80 chairs would be enough. I had hoped we might have to set up a few more. I thought that on a hot holiday weekend afternoon, a good turnout would be 120. We were wonderfully wrong! The final count was 259! Amazing!

It is truly awesome that we are all part of something God is doing through us at Camp Merrill. Nebraska Baptists are in the middle of an "abundant gifts" demonstration! Please thank God every chance you get for the blessings and opportunities at Camp Merrill. Now our challenge is to put the facilities to good

We also see abundance in the response to The Good Soil Project. This is a process that gives churches the tools to prepare for and receive renewal.

We all can celebrate abundance when we see our children and youth reaching out to the "lost, the lonely, and the locked out." When young people capture a true mission vision, it's healthy for the whole church and for God's work in the world.

But the picture of region ministry could be drawn differently.

Merrill can't make its budget. I could describe that in 2005, ABC/NE ended the year with a deficit for the first time in my tenure. I could describe the ways the staff of ABC/NE and Camp Merrill are exhausted from overwork. I could describe churches that are stuck, caught up in disagreements or frustrations. I could describe a church that uses its baptistry as a storeroom. [I'd like to see them clean it out and fill it with water in expectation.]

Should I panic?

No! Read Psalm 77. The first part of the psalm is full of despair. But at verse 11, the psalmist gets ahold of himself and essentially says, "Wait a minute! What's the matter with me? I need to look at the BIG picture. I need to PRAY." [The verse actually reads: "I will call to mind the deeds of the Lord; I will remember . . . I will meditate on all your work."] The psalm finishes with a tribute to the power and majesty of God. It tells about God being at work even when you can't see his footprints.

This IS a time of abundance!

The Baptists in Nebraska are blessed with abundance. We have great ministry opportunities [local church renewal, Camp Merrill, Sturgis, Churches Helping Churches, etcl. We have great people to work with just look around and see them with God's eyes]. We believe in celebrating God's gifts of abundance [family reunion, camp dedications, church anniversaries, etc]. We are willing to work and enjoy this ministry . . . and trust God to guide the way.

This is a great time to be in ministry in Nebraska.

A Day in the Life of a Sturgis Emergency Services Center Staffer

This will be the sixth year of the ABC Emergency Services Center at the Motorcycle Rally in the Black Hills. Every year many of our volunteers come from ABC churches in Nebraska and every year a number of potential volunteers talk to me about what it would be like for them if they were to come up to help. I can't really say what kind of experiences you would have if you signed on as a staff volunteer, but I thought it would be helpful to those teetering on the brink to know what a typical midweek day might look like. This is a compilation of "A Day in the Life of the ABC-ESC."

We are awakened by the smell of fresh coffee and frying bacon in the kitchen as members of our host church continue their custom of preparing us breakfast each morning. Some of our colleagues have been up much of the night providing transportation to several women whose husbands or boyfriends left them stranded when they were arrested for driving while intoxicated. They sleep through breakfast. While we eat, Pastor Pat McBride and I provide the staff that has gathered with a briefing of the day's special projects. Shortly after finishing the breakfast dishes the first call of the morning comes in. The charge nurse in the Deadwood Hospital ER is looking for someone to provide transportation back to one of the big campgrounds for a couple who went down on their bike last night. They spent the night getting bandaged up and are now

being released.

Two volunteers, a man and a woman (as is our custom), take one of the minivans provided by a local car dealer to pick them up. They also take one of the cell phones (also donated by a local business) and a set of Mapquest maps generated by our dispatcher. When they get to the hospital they are introduced to the couple and learn that they would like to stop by the impound lot to meet the insurance adjustor and to look over their bike. No problem. We do this so often we don't even need to stop back by the church for another map. The couple is not hurt too badly and is genuinely interested in knowing why our two volunteers are willing to take one of their vacation weeks to come to the Rally to do what they do. An interesting conversation focused on spiritual things dominates the ride to meet the insurance man.

Back at the church a group of volunteers who are on the schedule for the afternoon have decided to use some of their free time to drive down to see Mount Rushmore. Another group is heading into Sturgis to see if they can score some tee shirts for their grandchildren. Just before lunch another call comes in, this time from a man looking for help finding an electrical part for his out-of-production Excelsior-Henderson. One of our

What is "White Cross"?

Many American Baptist churches have "White Cross Sundays" when the congregation dedicates school supplies, recreation materials, clothing, etc. and ships them off to a mission location. But many folks aren't really sure what's behind it all. And some churches aren't involved at all. What is "White Cross"?

For many years, American Baptist "helping hands" have been reaching out to people in need. During World War I, many church women assisted the American Red Cross by providing surgical dressings, bandages, and other medical supplies for U.S. service personnel. In 1919, following the end of the war, two American Baptist women from Cleveland, Ohio organized the "White Cross Service League," channeling the war effort into support for Baptist mission.

White Cross has been embraced by local churches throughout the US. Congregations are eager to fill specific requests from mission workers. Through White Cross gifts, church members provide urgently-needed supplies that cannot be purchased with limited mission budgets.

Through the years, American Baptist women have given leadership in this ministry, which now provides some \$800,000 annually in mission support. And entire congregations often work together to fill White Cross requests. Churches can give money or ask for a list of needed items and purchase them. Some churches have expert "shoppers" who are skilled at seeking out bargains. Filling a White Cross request can give the shoppers a good time for a good cause.

The importance of White Cross is undiminished today, and the need for both funds and practical items is greater than ever. American Baptists are generous and caring people with a true heart for mission. White Cross needs your helping hands! If your church has an AB Women's Ministries group, contact them for information on how you can help. Otherwise, contact Steve Bils at the Region Office



volunteers goes online and finds an E-H Owners group and tries one of the telephone numbers listed for the president. He reaches him -- only to learn that he is in Sturgis, at the same campground as our caller, and has just the spare part needed in his trailer. Within 45 minutes of his call for help, the man rides up to the church on his newly-repaired E-H to thank us.

Two more pairs are sent out in response to calls for help. The first is from the South Dakota Highway Patrol looking for a chaplain to come the ER in Rapid City to comfort the family of a young woman who was fatally injured when she lost control of her bike and missed a curve. This is not the kind of call many feel comfortable taking so two of our pastors take this one. They won't be back until late tonight. The second call is from the owner of a campground near Custer. He thinks a man who is camping there has the flu and is too weak to ride his bike safely into town to the walk-in clinic. He wants to know if we can give him a ride. This will take about three hours but the man with the flu attends a Baptist church back home and is intrigued by what we are doing. He wants to come back next year and help us.

Throughout the afternoon several people stop by the church, drawn by the large banners announcing the location of the *ABC Emergency Services Center – Open 24 Hours* or by the address printed on one of the posters or tracts available throughout the area. Some come by to make a free long-distance telephone call or to get a drink and find out more about

who we are and whether we can give them gas money for their trip home (we can't).


About this time stomachs are growling and a discussion about dinner leads to an executive decision in favor of jambalaya with smoked sausage. A couple of volunteers walk next door to get the necessary ingredients and return to prepare a fine meal that tends to be eaten in shifts as folks filter back to the church. Those who were on duty during the day walk to downtown Deadwood to search for souvenirs, ogle motorcycles, and rummage through the antiques shops. The evening staff waits by the telephone for the next call.

Throughout the evening and night four more calls will result in teams being dispatched to provide comfort and transportation to individuals and couples in need. Additionally, a sheriff's deputy will stop by with a young mother and her infant daughter stranded when her boyfriend is picked up on an out-of-state warrant. Within an hour the young woman has her first warm meal in three days (jambalaya) and is on her way to the woman's shelter in Spearfish. Tomorrow we will go back for her and take her into Rapid City to catch a bus home.

And then comes the smell of fresh coffee and bacon . . .

Ask Your Campers for Reports . . .

Ask the children and youth in your church who attended camp at Camp Merrill this summer to make reports. They could report to the whole congregation in worship, at a church dinner or gathering, to adult Sunday School classes or to men's or women's groups. Vary the style of the reports from year to year. One approach is to have an adult or youth interview the campers. Let the campers know ahead of time that you will be asking them to describe two things 1. a worship or learning experience (could be a campfire, a service in the chapel, etc.) 2. an outdoor experience (horseback riding, swimming, a new game or activity, etc.)

Another approach is to stage a little play. Have two campers tell someone who didn't go to camp what it was like. Have them begin with the fun and silly stuff. The person who didn't attend camp says that it sounds like fun. Then the campers say "it was fun but it was more than that. It

really means something. We can make a difference in the world. At camp we started learning how. The better we know Jesus, the more difference we can make." (And they can add something about worship or learning at camp.)

Plan on wrapping up the summer at Family Camp on Labor Day Weekend (Sept 1-4). Stay in RVs, tents, Lodge rooms, cabins. Arrange ahead with camp for whichever meals you want. The schedule will be relaxed & enjoyable — wagon rides, campfires, storytelling, disc golf, cargo net. Do as much or as little as you wish. The ABC/NE and Camp Staff will provide leadership.

The Good Soil Project . . . An Invitation to Church Renewal

Over the last few weeks we have had two very successful informational meetings explaining the Good Soil project. On June 17th, people from ten churches gathered in Grand Island to learn about the project. On July 8th, an additional three Panhandle churches came together in Alliance for a similar purpose.

The Good Soil Project builds on the learnings from the Small Church Renewal Project (a national project in which Bridgeport participated about five years ago), and Tomorrow's Harvest (a tri-Region renewal project that involved four ABC/NE churches.)

Representatives from participating churches will gather three times a year for two years. Each gathering will begin and close with worship. Churches will share their experiences and progress. Participants will pray for renewal. And churches will learn about the process of renewal by listening to presentations and studying the renewal literature. Between gatherings, churches will engage in "homework," that will lead to "renewal readiness."

Early in the process, training will focus on personal spiritual practices. Later, the focus will be on the progressive steps leading a church through renewal.

The Good Soil Project is funded jointly by a grant from ABC's National Ministries and by ABC-Nebraska. To qualify, churches: must have to have an average Sunday attendance of less than 150; an annual income of less than \$250,000; and be located in a community of less than 50,000.

The first meetings will be in Alliance on October 21st and in Grand Island on October 28th. The deadline for signing on to the project is September 17th (the last day of the Family Reunion).


OMAHA PARKSIDE: Surplus garden products are being shared on the "Bounty Table."
